

Whale Shark

Guide training in Mexico





We created a manual to help boat trip operators protect the largest fish on Earth



The whale shark is the largest fish in the sea, growing to about the length of a double decker bus. It is classified as 'Endangered' by the IUCN.

Boat trips to see these sharks are popular in areas of Mexico including Isla Mujeres and Cancun. The animals are slow-moving, often near the surface of the water and, as they feed mainly on plankton, pose no danger to divers. In the last five years, the popularity of whale shark snorkeling trips has grown tremendously.

With the problem of over-fishing affecting their livelihoods, many local fishermen began to operate whale shark tours with little or no experience of guiding or knowledge of the whale shark.

In 2008 the Travel Foundation identified that training in environmental interpretation, safety procedures and customer management would help guides ensure the safety and wellbeing of whale sharks during tourist excursions. This would also lead to a better experience for tourists.

Working with local organisations

We worked with local and international organisations including the Maldives Whale Shark Research Programme (MWSRP) to develop training courses for guides.

EcoColors, a Cancun-based company with over six years of experience in running whale shark trips was responsible for delivering the training.


Delivering training

The first 40-hour course was delivered in November 2009, training 23 local guides. It covered areas including biology and ecology of whale sharks, research, conservation, guest briefings, codes of conduct and guidelines for whale shark encounters.

Certification

A manual for the training, with presentations, reference notes and activity cards, was provided online, and at the end of the course participants received a certificate.





Working in Collaboration

The Travel Foundation developed partnerships between several local organisations, as well as Mexico's Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment.

The Benefits

Following our collaboration with the Quintana Roo and Baja California Sur state governments, the training is now a mandatory requirement for all whale shark guides in the region.

New legislation

This project directly influenced whale shark guiding legislation: the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environment accredited the training and introduced new legislation requiring all new guides to have completed the training course, ensuring that all guides operating the tours are certified.

A positive experience for tourists

71% of tourists interviewed rated the tours taken with licenced guides as excellent.

More income for guides

By providing a better customer experience, 60% of guides interviewed reported an increase in income from tips. Of these, around three quarters of the guides estimated that tips had increased by more than 50%.
